# Epiphany

Merry Christmas and a blessed feast of the Epiphany! The Church proclaims on Epiphany - the twelfth day of Christmas - in her Divine Liturgy, "Today the Church is espoused to the heavenly Bridegroom, for in the Jordan, Christ washes her sins: the Magi hasten with gifts to the regal nuptials, and the guests are gladdened with water becoming wine, alleluia."

The solemn feast of Christmas brings with it great peace that the world cannot give and joy that cannot be taken away from the Christian soul. She beholds the Holy Face taken by God the Son, the same Face that the patriarchs and prophets and all of the holy ones yearned to see. The angels of Heaven taught Israel to glorify God, for what words could man devise to praise the Most High for His divine condescension?

While Epiphany is not to be set against Christmas (especially since there is no Epiphany without Christmas) this Solemnity of Epiphany can be said to be the greater of the two feasts. It is the completion of Christmas. God had united Himself to us in a human body and soul; however, we still needed to be cleansed of the sin of Adam as well as of our own. The nations in darkness still needed to see a great light. The promises to Judah were being fulfilled in Christmas, but Epiphany was needed to gather in the lost tribes of Israel who had been scattered into the Gentile nations. These same tribes had lost their identity and their memory. They could no longer identify with the tribes of Benjamin, Gad, Asher or any of the others.

What could God possibly do to restore the twelve tribes of Israel? His answer was to gather the nations to Himself, the very nations that in some sense swallowed up the lost tribes of Israel. In this sense, Epiphany is the feast of hoping against hope (Rom 4:18).

Epiphany is the feast of shining His refulgent light to even the darkest corners of the world. What would be brought to fulfillment throughout the centuries began with the three Magi coming from their various kingdoms in the East to worship the true God. It is a feast that overthrows the powers of darkness that held man in the dungeon of error and sin. It beckons you and me to step into His light, the radiant splendor of His Eucharistic Face. Thus, Christmas is completed in the Epiphany, and Eucharistic Adoration is revealed as an inexpressible gift of God. We can rejoice as at the wedding feast of Cana where Christ has saved the best for this last age. We are freed from our spiritual captors, cleansed of our sins, and called friends of God. May we not be friends in name only. Come, let us adore Him.


Sister Mary Triana's Silver Jubilee of Religious Profession
